Pastor Deborah



Sam and I enjoy taking an evening walk through our neighborhood, although with his long stride he is often half a block ahead of me. It can sometimes be challenging to get him out the door, but once we are on the way he loves to check out the neighbors' decorations for Halloween, then Thanksgiving, and now Christmas. The folks around us now have lots of lights, inflatables, and Santa's on their rooftops (replacing the spiders of Halloween and the turkeys of Thanksgiving)

The last few weeks we have needed flashlights after 6:30 for this walk, it is dark! Every day the night comes sooner and lingers longer. This time

before Christmas is always a season of darkness – the darkest day is also the shortest, on December 21.

In the church, we know these dark December days as Advent – four weeks of spiritual preparation leading up to the celebration of the birth of Jesus. During Advent, even as we anticipate the joy of Christmas Eve, we prepare, in part, by acknowledging our darkness, and the darkness of the world. We don't do it to punish ourselves. We do it to remind ourselves how much we STILL need that special baby who was laid in a manger more than two thousand years ago, because there was no room.

This year we are using a resource from Adam Hamilton entitled, *Prepare the Way of the Lord* to shape our worship messages and Advent reflections. Hamilton reminds us that the Advent Season is not just about waiting for the baby Jesus to show up. It has also traditionally been about preparing our hearts and spirits for the anticipated second coming of Christ. The story is not yet complete, but one day it will be, with his triumphant return. The question for our spiritual reflection is simply this: Are we ready?

One of the key biblical characters in the lectionary (the assigned readings for this season) is John the Baptist, who came "to prepare the way of the Lord." He was a fearsome prophet in the wilderness whose cry echoes through the centuries: "Repent!" By that John meant more than inviting people to say "I'm sorry for what I have been and done."

Repentance is much more than acknowledging and having remorse for our sin and waywardness, although both are necessary to help us understand our failings. It involves making a deliberate and conscious choice to turn away from that sin and waywardness toward the new life that can always be ours in Christ. It involves transformation of ourselves and of our world.

One of my deliberate and conscious choices this season is to make more time and space for God. I try to spend at least a half hour in prayer at the beginning of my day, but often that time is cut short and sometimes missed altogether. So I am getting up a little earlier to make sure I don't shortchange the creator of the universe, who must be pretty busy himself, but who unimaginably will make time and space for me if I will make time and space for him.

I hope you will spend a little time reflecting on what would be helpful for your spiritual journey. How will you turn away from things that hold you back in your relationship to God and turn toward the goodness and grace of the One who loves you enough to send his Son to set you free?

May your season and your Christmas be deeply blessed.

Then, it's Sunday! Yes, Church is on Sunday between all of this, and it's important we take that time to be in the House of God together as His family! Then, it's back to shopping on "Cyber Monday." Online business offers some of their best sales of the year, and you can snap up great bargains if you're quick enough! Then, it's "Giving Tuesday"! This particular day has been somewhat of a new phenomenon in the past few years as people are encouraged to give to ministries, churches, non-profits, and more on this special day. I've honestly wondered why the "Giving" day is after all the spending days. In my opinion, it should be first!



WELCOME OUR NEW MEMBERS



CALLING ALL CITRUS GLEANING VOLUNTEERS

Each year volunteers from SHUMC and PRIDES partner to glean citrus from homes in Sun City



West. This is the 7th season of this volunteer partnership in service! Gleaning teams work together to pick oranges, grapefruit and lemons for St. Mary's Food Bank. The oranges, lemons and grapefruit are distributed in food boxes to families and individuals through the food bank. Home owners and HOA groups who have their trees gleaned also make a donation to the food bank.

Gleaning will start Wednesday, January 31 and continues every Wednesday for 9 weeks. Last year the group gleaned over 180 trees, resulting in thousands of pounds of citrus for the food bank.

A mission project of this scope requires volunteers. There is no tree climbing involved! No ladders. We use claw like pickers. Jobs are: pickers, muckers (those that pick up the fruit that the pickers pluck and put it in crates) and mules (using handcarts to move the crates to the truck). It is a special type of fellowship, working alongside your church and community friends.

Volunteers meet at SHUMC at 8:00 am to get their assignments with the goal of starting gleaning at 8:30 am. The groups usually finish assigned trees by 11:30.

Confirmation calls are made in December to everyone who had a tree gleaned last year. Please go out in your yard and check your trees- this summer was hard on our local plant life! STUFFED IN A BURLAP SACK, NOT ME!

Since Christmas is almost here, I thought I would tell you how the Dutch celebrate the arrival of Santa. We don't do that on the 25th but on the 5th of December. We don't have a Santa either, but a Sinterklaas. History has it that during the Middle Ages, there lived in Spain, a St. Nicolas, an old, kind man who loved people. His name was later changed to Sinterklaas (the i sounds like the i in sit). To the Dutch, he represents someone who is kind and considerate although he is not a push-over! Everyone needs to behave themselves, children and adults alike!

Sinterklaas, his two aides and his horse arrive by boat from Spain. He is beautifully dressed in long red robes embroidered with gold and wears a matching hat. His aides are outfitted in silk colorful jackets. The mayor welcomes them all, there are speeches, his horse is fed and the best way to go is planned. He climbs on his horse which is capable of walking over the rooftops and it is said that if you listen carefully you can hear the clatter of his hooves! How Sinterklaas at his age can climb down to the front door is not known. Off they go, usually during early evening, with one aide carrying a big book which has all the names of the children and the other a large sack with presents. However... if you were not well behaved and considerate the past year there would be no presents for you, or you might get spanked or worse, taken to Spain in that sack, brrr! All this is very worrisome to a small child as Sinterklaas knows everything.... Therefore many children put out some carrots for the horse a week ahead: it might improve their chances

I was an only child of elderly parents and raised by a soft-spoken mother and a strict father who had an office on the second floor of our home. Ever since I was old enough to understand, he told me to be quiet at all times and so I grew up to be a shy, quiet little girl, always afraid to do wrong. Weeks before December 5 my father had already warned me about St. Nicolas and "the sack" adding I had better be extra good. I didn't know what he meant by that, I was always good!

When December 5 came, my mother tried to reassure me. I had been good all year! Not to worry! But I couldn't eat. All I could think of was that big, black sack! Then, our doorbell rang and I just knew it was Sinterklaas- I would not be considered a good girl. What would it be, a spanking or that sack.. My mother opened the front door. "Hello Sinterklaas," I heard her say, "please come in." The door opened and in he walked with one of aides shaking a bundle of twigs. He sat down, opened his book and frowned! At that moment something burst inside me and all my pent-up anger spilled out. I was NOT going to be spanked or into that sack!! I pushed my mother aside and looked Sinterklaas straight in the eye. What was that? I knew those eyes and those glasses and that voice.. It was my father!! I screamed it out loud, "you are NOT Sinterklaas, you're my father". He wouldn't admit it but his helpers started to laugh and that was the end of my belief in Sinterklaas. He stood up, left, went upstairs and nothing was ever said about it. The rest of us had hot chocolate and I was given a beautiful doll!

It was also the last time we celebrated Sinterklaas. The following year on May 10 Germany entered the Netherlands and we lived the next five years with all the horrors of WWII.

Thinking back to that episode with its worries and fears, I firmly believe that Santa is a far better choice to make children happy than Sinterklaas. I also know that the image of him has changed over the years and has become more "Santa" like which is a good thing.

I wish you all a very happy and blessed Christmas!


